

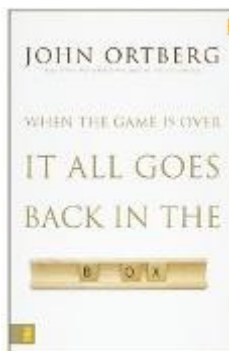

Senior Minister's September Pastoral Letter – Matt's Matters

Dear sisters and brothers,

Many of you will have heard of the death of John Stott this past week; he died peacefully at home with friends beside him. Over the years John Stott has made a huge impact on my ministry both from the preaching schools I've attended at which he spoke and more especially through his books and commentaries. The Anglican Church, indeed the worldwide Christian community has lost one of its giants, but of course he is not lost, he is actually at last home with the Lord he served with such energy, wisdom and dedication for over 70 years. Two members of the Leighton Ford Point Group to which I belong, sent me an email with tributes to John. One is a strong Presbyterian and the other of Charismatic persuasion and they got me thanking God for John and also thinking about my own reflections of this outstanding and gifted brother in Christ. One lesson in particular I thought was worthy of comment in this month's pastoral letter is reflected in the fact that John would be loved and honoured by two ministers from quite different church backgrounds.

John always remained a committed Anglican and yet was also a world Christian. He was able to enjoy fellowship and exercise ministry across a vast range of Christians across all cultures and denominations, gaining their respect and admiration. His deep commitment to the central place of the authority of Scripture in matters of doctrine and practice was wonderfully expressed to in much of the Lausanne Covenant (for a copy refer to www.lausanne.org/covenant). John was the chief author of this document, which was so thoughtfully and thoroughly biblically written that nearly every Christian denomination readily assents to it.

John in so many ways demonstrated how Christians of different denominations, with their own theological perspectives, should be able to engage in robust theological debate with the Scriptures open and, despite not always coming to like minds, remain in fellowship around the gospel. John truly was a believer who reflected the generosity of Christ as he engaged with sisters and brothers from across the global church and worked tirelessly to deepen the theological depth and gospel width of the Church across all nations. I have a great desire that we as a whole church can be a community of faith who, like John Stott, place the Scriptures as our final authority and that we let it be the continuous shaper of our understanding of God and life. Like him, I urge us not to read the Scriptures to discover and confirm what we have already determined is there, but rather to open the Bible to discover what God has revealed. This will mean a willingness to listen to Christians from different tribes to ensure we are not blinded by our own prejudices. This does not mean our doctrine/teaching is completely fluid, changing every week. As the Lausanne Covenant and the well known Christian creeds show, there are substantial basic fundamentals we can all affirm. But on second order issues (eg. the method of baptism, styles of worship, women's ministry, Church governance, etcetera) we should be wise like Stott and be generous in our approach. Yes we establish what we believe but we don't ever close the books. Rather, in the fellowship of the worldwide church we seek God's face in prayer and Bible study because we recognize with great humility there may yet be more truth to be revealed from Scripture.

I hope you will join me in giving thanks to God for John Stott, a man of enormous intellect and scholarship and yet a humble, prayerful, godly brother in Christ, who served the Anglican and worldwide church with energy, integrity and grace.

How does giving up something for 40 hours help someone who struggles to have enough food every day??



At St Matthews this year, we are taking the way we do the 40 Hour Famine to whole new level! Where does the money go and why should I support it?

In East Timor, a mere 600kms from Aussie shores, I met some really poor families that faced a massive obstacle every day just to have enough food to survive. The inequality between us and them is shocking and outstanding! However, one of the most amazing things I saw in East Timor was the impact and transformation of families and communities from the work of World Vision.

Lourdes, Antonio and their children were struggling to survive on one basic meal a day of cassava (like sweet potato) just 4 years ago. Through World Vision's agricultural training and interventions the family now produces enough to sufficiently feed the family plus sell surplus to markets! They have recently built a concrete house which will soon have electricity. The whole family now eats well and all their children (except for the youngest) now go to school. Famine funds help that to happen...

As a Christian, I want my life to demonstrate the love of God and the glory of his kingdom following the example of Jesus and his compassion to the poor which is undeniably evident in the Scriptures. Supporting the 40 Hour Famine is an extremely powerful way to do this. Change through this work is real – I have seen it firsthand. Warden's Update



Financial Matters

Late last year, we asked all members of St Matthews to review their giving, and to prayerfully consider if they could *increase* it and make it *regular*.

As reported in the last issue of Matt's Matters it is obvious that many have prayerfully considered their situation and have increased their regular giving. We are very grateful for God's blessings which have continued during the months of May and June.

Our June offerings, excluding rectory and building fund, totaled \$65,179 for the month. This was \$2,141 ahead of the budget for that month. This represented an average weekly giving of \$16,294.

However, when we take into account additional special donations that have been made during the first six months of the year our Average Weekly Giving for the 6 months to the end of June rises to \$17,968, which is \$1,920 (12%) above the budgeted giving and \$3,913 (28.3%) above the same period last year.

This is a very encouraging result and clearly something for which to give thanks. We must however be mindful of the fact that we are operating in 2011 to an exceptionally tight budget which included substantial restrictions on staffing, maintenance and capital expenditure. The growth in our giving, provided it continues, should allow a slightly more expansive budget in 2012. This would permit staffing that is closer to meeting our ministry needs and objectives. The results of early advanced planning suggest that we will need an average weekly offering of \$19,600 which would be 9.1% above our average weekly offerings of \$17,968 for the first six months of this year.

Whilst on financial matters, did you know that if you have a discretionary trust you might be able to make a distribution directly to St Matt's and in doing so give to the work and ministry of St Matt's from your gross income.

It is usually a good idea to obtain advice from your accountant prior to making any distribution of this nature but if you would like to discuss how this could work, please contact Colin Gibb or Claire Jones.

The Church Roof

Many will be aware of the problems with the church roof; it is fine unless it rains, when leaks become a significant problem, causing both damage and inconvenience. This is a problem that is unlikely to be solved without significant expense; however, as a trial we have agreed to modify a small section of the roof by fitting a larger 'valley'. The section above the Sunday School cupboard in Hall 1 has been modified. We will let you know if this 'test fix' works.

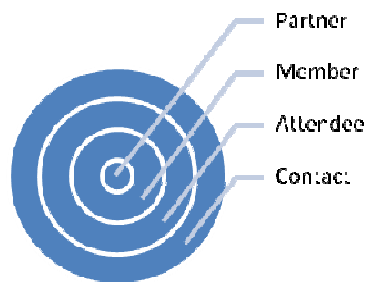

It was exciting to have the first meeting of the StMatts@School Congregational Life Leaders on Friday 15 July. Present at the meeting were Virginia Coote, Meredith Donkin, John Hadden, Peter Ryan, and Simone Tobia. It was a great time together as we began to understand some of the pastoral issues which face the 9am congregation, and how this team may be able to lead our members in congregational life together.

I shared what I think the bible explains are the 3 key elements of pastoral ministry, being teaching, governance, and care. We considered how we could work to disciple our members in order that they may be disciple - making disciples as Matt 28:18-20 calls them to be. Part of this discussion was to consider the following diagram and think about how we lead people toward the centre.



Some important factors to come out of this discussion were:

- ♦ What is the impact of meeting in a place that is not ours for the remainder of the week?
- ♦ How may we better integrate this congregation with the resources, facilities, ministries, and overall life of St Matt's parish?
- ♦ How are people travelling in their current ministries; are there efforts sustainable, invigorating or taxing, viable?
- ♦ What is the optimum way for 9am to proceed in terms of size and focus?
- ♦ How does 9am fit within the mapping of all the St Matt's Congregations?
- ♦ How can we help to ensure no one is missing out on Christian fellowship and care?

Clearly there is much to pray about, and a series of questions to work through. I will keep you posted.

Hillston

Situated on the banks of the Lachlan River, Hillston is a centre for dryland crop farming, sheep grazing, and fruit and vegetable production. The township of approximately 900 people has large properties which, due to ongoing drought, often rely on bore water. Ministry in a town of this size relies on fairly traditional avenues of outreach: confirmation classes, baptism interviews, Bible studies, scripture teaching, and Sunday services.



Lindsay and Lyn Whybrow

Lindsay and Carolyn Whybrow moved from their home in Springwood NSW into the Rectory at Christ the King Anglican Church at Hillston in January 2007. Lindsay became the ministry leader at the church. They live in the community, participate in local activities, and are regarded as BCA Co-Workers. As well as traditional means of outreach such as confirmation classes and Bible studies, the Whybrows collaborate with churches from Sydney to deliver annual mission events such as a holiday club for children and a variety of social nights.

The Whybrows are link Missionaries with St Matthews and our ‘Grey Nomads’, our Young Adults and Evening Service congregations have made visits to do property maintenance, run programs and generally encourage the Whybrows in their difficult and sometimes frustrating work.

Lindsay says:

“At times I feel very much like a one man band. That's just the way it is. There is some outreach happening in one form or another. There is much time consuming relationship building to go on. I long to see God's word not return to Him empty, but to accomplish that for which he sends it.
